



First of all, please go and see Marisa Fierro at our International Relations Office (BUILDING 4 in the map below).

She will fill in and sign your arrival certificate and will then register you as a student at the University of Zaragoza. She will first provide you with your STUDENT'S ID NUMBER and PASSWORD (i.e. NIP y CONTRASEÑA ADMINISTRATIVA). Subsequently, she will enrol you in the modules/subjects included in your Learning Agreement.

With your Student's ID and administrative password fully operational, you will be able to set up your UNIZAR student's e-mail account, as well as your on-line (no plastic) student's card.

- ✓ But...where can you set up or activate your e-mail account? Do please note that your student's e-mail account will be your STUDENT'S ID + @unizar.es (for example: 699999@unizar.es). For your e-mail account to be fully up and running, you must first log into https://portalcorreo.unizar.es/ with your NIP and CONTRASEÑA ADMINISTRATIVA (i.e. ID + PASSWORD). Once you're in, you will be asked to come up with and provide your e-mail's password. Your contraseña administrativa (administrative password) need not coincide with your e-mail's password. Your e-mail address + password will grant you access to the WIFI on Campus.
- And now...how can you activate your student's card? Do please download the App "CRUE UNIZAR" on your mobile phone:

Once the photo has been uploaded, you will need to get your face pic officially validated at Teruel Campus' main Student Admin Office (SECRETARÍA DE CAMPUS: Building 4 in the map above).

# ✓ HOW TO GET TO TERUEL?

#### **BY PLANE**

- **Barcelona**. From El Prat airport (T2: Terminal 2) take the local train network "cercanías/rodalies R2" \* to the "Barcelona-Sants" train station. The single ticket is 2.2€ and the estimated travel time is 15 minutes.
- Madrid. From Adolfo Suárez Madrid-Barajas airport (T4: Terminal 4) take the local train network "cercanías C1" \* to the "Estación de Atocha" train station (Atocha Renfe). The single ticket is 2.6€ and the estimated travel time is 30 minutes. If you arrive at T2 (Terminal 2), take the underground/subway from Barajas Airport Station (T1-T2-T3) to Atocha Renfe (train station) (https://www.metromadrid.es/en). The ticket costs around 6€ and the estimated travel time is 55 minutes.
- Valencia. From Valencia airport take the metro line 3 or 5 to "Estació del Nord" train station. The single ticket is 2€ and the estimated travel time is 20 minutes
- Zaragoza. From Zaragoza airport take the bus to the "Estación Delicias" train and bus station (they are both in the same building). The single ticket is 1.85€ and the estimated travel time is 20 minutes.

\* Passengers with an AVE (high-speed train) ticket can use the code "código combinado cercanías" included in their ticket to get a free ticket in the local train network service connecting the airport with the train station. It can be purchased at the RENFE machines located in the airport.

#### **BY TRAIN**

Train tickets can be bought at <u>http://www.renfe.com/EN/viajeros/index.html</u>. How to get to the Teruel Train Station (address: Camino de la estación, s/n) from:

• **Barcelona Sants** - Teruel (train change in Zaragoza; high-speed train [AVE] from Barcelona-Sants to Zaragoza-Delicias). It takes approximately 5 hours.

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- Madrid Atocha Teruel (train change in Zaragoza; high-speed train [AVE] from Madrid-Atocha to Zaragoza-Delicias). It takes approximately 4:30 hours.
- Valencia Estació del Nord Teruel. It takes approximately 2:30 hours.
- Zaragoza Delicias Teruel. It takes approximately 2:30 hours.



#### BY BUS

Long-distance bus tickets can be bought at the bus company's website. There are various bus companies operating to and fro between Teruel and such cities as Barcelona, Madrid, Valencia or Zaragoza:


How to get to Teruel by car:

- Barcelona (409km): road AP-7 and N-420. It takes approximately 4 hours.
- Madrid (300km): road A-2 and N-211. It takes approximately 3 hours. Or road N-420. It takes approximately 3:30 hours.
- Valencia (140km): road A-23. It takes approximately 1:30 hours. / Or road CV-35 and A-23. It takes approximately 2 hours.
- Zaragoza (180km): road A-23. It takes approximately 1:30 hours. / Or road A-222 and N-420. It takes approximately 2 hours.

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# ✓ A STROLL AROUND TERUEL...GETTING TO KNOW OUR BEAUTIFUL CITY!

The city of Teruel, in the North East of the Iberian Peninsula, exhibits rich diversity. Such diversity is displayed, first and foremost, in the artistic blending epitomized by its outstanding Mudejar heritage, rendering Teruel a UNESCO world heritage site. Secondly, it is enclosed in the city walls and the surrounding areas, which exhibit nearly all kinds of Art: the Baroque of the Church of El Salvador, the Gothic of the church of Los Franciscanos, the Mannerist influence of the City Museum (the Community Hall in the past), or the Renaissance style of the aqueduct-viaduct of Los Arcos, among others. Thirdly, multiplicity is revealed through the miscellaneous and

colourful buildings typical of the Modernist style, all of them naturally integrated into the historical city centre and in some of the boroughs. Finally, even the geographical features of the city are diverse in essence: even though Teruel is among the capital cities with the lowest population in the country (between 35 and 36 thousand inhabitants), it is home to one of the biggest and most famous love stories, even preceding Shakespeare's well-known tragedy; even though its river, Turia, is famous as it flows down to Valencia, here it is no more than the result of two tributaries meeting at the foot of the city; moreover, even though it has more hours of sun than any other capital city in Spain, it is renowned for its freezing temperatures accentuated by an altitude of 915 metres above sea level, both previous qualities providing a unique environment for one of the best delights in Teruel: its cured ham.

Teruel is a city of walkers and you will be able to do it yourself by following the wise advice of the following three characters who shared their lives in the medieval times and are, again, an example of diversity and inclusion. Each one will propose a thematic route to you, but there are many others at each corner of the city (http://www.turismo.teruel.es/)...

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Hi, my name is AISHA, Bravery in Arabic, and I fearlessly worked in the Mudejar building works. You can see it in the



drawings remaining on the Cathedral wooden ceiling. This is the best starting point for the *Mudejar route*: you should start wandering inside and around the Cathedral of Santa María de Mediavilla. Then, you should head to the gate of Andaquilla. A stunning



tower protects this gate: it is the exquisite tower of San Martín





(https://www.aragonmudejar.com/teruel/pag/samartin1e.htm). You should admire its ornaments and then go down towards the riverbank where you will discover another gate defended by another tower: it is the delicate tower of El Salvador (http://www.teruelmudejar.com/home\_en.html). You ought to go through the church and get out by using the door opening to Nueva street; then, you should go up Amargura street and proceed to the church of San Pedro. You will find The Lovers of Teruel Foundation and their mausoleum there (http://www.amantesdeteruel.es/): love and history holding hands, the oldest Mudejar tower, a magnificent cloister and sublime church... unspeakable... and

also unavoidable in this route (and one of the corner sociocultural programme). They are the real essence of But not the only ones...



stones in our conference the Mudejar Art in my town.

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Hello, I am Fernando, my name means the bravest one providing peace and this is how I behaved with my war comrades in medieval times: I worked peacefully with the Jews and the Muslims without overlooking



exchange for their skilful jobs and

expertise. We erected walls and churches, aqueducts and flights of steps all through the times. That is the reason why I recommend the *functional route* of those constructions built with a specific purpose (as any building, by the way) but many times not so renowned: walk along the parts of the wall made for the protection of the city remaining

(https://www.murallasdeteruel.com/). If you do so, you will see the gates still standing nowadays (San Miguel, La Traición and Daroca) or the watchtowers (Ambeles, San Esteban, el Rincón or La Bombardera). Also, the aqueductviaduct, Los Arcos, supplying the medieval cisterns under El Torico square. Sustenance for souls and spirits was important in my time, so do not forget to visit churches such as El Salvador de la Merced, El Salvador, San Pedro, San Andrés, Los Franciscanos or the cathedral. Moreover, visit the convents and monasteries like Las Claras, El Sagrado Corazón, Las Carmelitas, el Seminario Conciliar or the House of El Deán. You will also feed your senses with the many types of art they preserve and the numerous treasures kept in the museum of Sacred Art (http://www.diocesisdeteruel.org/museoartesacro.html). Walk up and down La Escalinata (Stairway) created for the connection of the Turia riverbank and the upper Torico city centre; it summarises the diverse spirit of Teruel in every



step, in every decorated

landing of these huge colourful stairs (http://www.patrimonioculturaldearagon.es/bienes-culturales/la-escalinatateruel). Finally, do not fail to recall the fusion of ancient history and present pride: the city museum (http://museo.deteruel.es/museoprovincial/), the archaeological sites and Dinópolis (https://www.dinopolis.com/). Please, walk, watch, wonder...

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Hullo, I am SHILOH. As my name states, I am a *present* for Christians and Muslims. As the good Jew I am, I helped both of them many times and I financed the Mudejar art in Teruel. Not only did I loan them, but I also established the foundations for the prosperous bourgeoisie in a distant future (19<sup>th</sup> century), when this wealthy middle-class came to Teruel and set up a new art thanks to artists like Pablo Monguió. I am talking about Modernism, which is the route I want to share with you, the **Modernist route**: it



is comfortable; you merely need to move around the city centre, mainly all over Torico Square and the surroundings

(<u>http://www.turismo.teruel.es/?nav=itinerarios\_modernismo&lang=en\_US</u>). You will have the opportunity to admire houses like Casa Bayo, Casa Ferrán, Casa Madrileña or Casa El Torico. If you walk up Tozal Street and go outside the city walls, you will be able to appreciate what one day were Arrabal schools (nowadays Archivo Histórico Provincial). Likewise, if you go further down along the riverbank of the newly born Turia, in Zaragoza Avenue, you will feel enraptured by El Carmen chapel. Finally, if you feel like visiting further places, you can drive yourself to Villaspesa, a village with the charming and colourful church of El Salvador.

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
